From the Pastor ... Mary, Mother of the Church

Through the centuries, many titles have been given to Mary. This year, an important one, proclaimed by the Second Vatican Council, was officially celebrated for the first time as a liturgical feast on the Monday following the Feast of Pentecost. This title honors Mary as the Mother of the Church. While Mary has held many titles, only a few of them have become part of the official worship tradition of our faith.

The first title honoring Mary resulted from a declaration at the Council of Ephesus (located in present day Turkey) held in 431. The Council honored her as the Mother of God, and this feast is today observed each year on January 1. Devotions in her honor have developed through the years, often guided by the needs of the Church at particular times. Often, Marian feasts have had important connections with feasts of Jesus – serving as complementary observances, i.e., Feast of Jesus' Birth (December 25) – Feast of Mary's Birth (September 8); the Ascension of Jesus into Heaven – the Assumption of Mary into Heaven.

The Second Vatican Council (1962-1965), when reflecting on the role and importance of Mary in the faith life of the Church in modern times, stressed two significant ways in which she serves as a support for Christians. One sees her as a Model for Christians and the other as Mother of the Church. These teachings are found in the Constitution on the Church (Chapter 8).

Both these titles remind us that Mary was a person just like us who, as the New Testament accounts teach, experienced both the joys and sorrows of life, who placed her faith in the love and compassion of God, and who sometimes struggled but always responded with faith and trust to life's challenges. This new feast of Mary, Mother of the Church, importantly reminds us that as the Holy Spirit on Pentecost sent believers to bring Jesus' message to others, so too are we called in our time to do the same - and Mary is there with us as we continue her Son's mission and message. We are the Church of God, the People of God and truly, fittingly, she is Mother of the Church.

Support St. Mary's By Buying Scrip

Parishioners often ask about the St. Mary's Scrip program and how it works to benefit our parish.

The answer is simple: Take into consideration the places where you normally shop and dine, as well as possibly purchasing gas at Tops or paying your Kohl's charge bills, using Scrip gift cards. Tops and Kohl's are just two of dozens of vendors available.

When you buy Scrip gift cards for any or all of these vendors, a percentage of every purchase comes back to the parish. There are no added fees.

For example, if you buy four \$100 Tops Scrip cards, St. Mary's earns a 5 percent rebate: \$20. If you purchase four \$100 Kohl's Scrip cards, the parish earns a 1 percent rebate: \$5. If you buy two \$10 Tim Horton's Scrip cards, St. Mary's earns a 5 percent rebate: \$1. While these totals are individually small, the numbers climb quickly when more and more people participate.

You can buy Scrip after Mass at the back entrance to Church (look for Scrip sellers there), in the St. Mary's Elementary School building on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 8 to 10 a.m., and at the Rectory on weekdays between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Some cards are available immediately; others must be ordered and can be picked up within about a week. Locked boxes are available in Church and at school, so orders can be dropped off there.



Parishioner Shares Story of Nicaragua Mission Trip

Kathleen Horvatits was one of seven St. Mary's parishioners who journeyed to Nicaragua on a parish mission trip in February. They were hosted by Ann Marie Zon, who has been doing missionary work in Nicaragua for 38 years. Reflecting on the experience, Kathleen writes:

Approximately 30 percent of Nicaraguans live on less than \$2 per day. In rural areas, poverty rates are especially high, with 50 percent of households living in extreme poverty. Ann Marie is one of three founders of The Nicaraguan Mission Project (The Mission), which serves the needlest population living in the Diocese of Granada. Our group had the good fortune of exposure to many of the projects developed and supported by The Mission, and saw first-hand the support of generous Western New Yorkers who have contributed to its success.

Our local community donates clothes, household goods, school supplies, furniture, religious items, and other



goods to support The Mission's efforts. (Examples of items needed can be found at http://www.projectnica.com/items_needed.htm). We found it amusing to observe many local citizens wearing clothing promoting the Buffalo Bills and Sabres in several communities!

Our team visited several churches, chapels, and missions, some of which were built primarily through support from Ann Marie and her Mission cofounders, Fr. Alfonso Alvarados and the late Fr. Leonel Navas.

Approximately 73 percent of Nicaraguans are Roman Catholic. Aided by donations from Western New Yorkers, the diocese was able to build the Sinai Retreat Center, a multi-building campus that furthers faith formation.

What I found most impactful was how passionately the Nicaraguan people practiced their faith through devotion to Jesus and the Blessed Virgin. Each Thursday brings Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament in local churches. Young and old alike come to pray, and weekend Mass at Jesus Rescate National Shrine is filled with pilgrims and joyous singing.

The Mission sponsors a program in which a cow is donated to the mother of an interested family. She signs a contract agreeing that the cow will be cared for, that two calves will be returned to the project, and that two homemade cheeses will be given to another family or an elderly person each month.

A similar program involves donating pigs to families. When these programs

were first implemented, livestock was purchased externally. The team subsequently bought acreage in the nearby mountains and created a farm where they now raise their own cows, pigs, and chickens. Donations of \$100 or \$50 will purchase a cow or pig, respectively, for a family in need.

Education is of significant importance to The Mission - and is the key to local residents' self-reliance. Schools are government operated and children must have uniforms to attend. Our team visited several schools, where we delivered supplies and snacks. Most of them had few or no books, and instructional aides such as black boards and bulletin boards were shabby or absent altogether. The Mission purchases uniforms in larger sizes so that students can wear them for at least two years. A donation of \$30 will sponsor a child to attend elementary school, \$50 will sponsor a child to attend middle school, and \$100 will sponsor a child to attend high school. A monthly donation of \$65 will sponsor a student to attend college.

I have said nothing of the diverse, raw beauty we observed throughout our trip, but words cannot do justice to this or any of our experiences. I am honored to have had the privilege of getting to know and develop lasting bonds with my fellow team members. Our team has been discussing how we can continue to support this important cause, and we anticipate plans for future missions.

St. Vincent de Paul Members Help Feed the Hungry

On any given Tuesday morning, a group of St. Mary's parishioners can be found in a commercial kitchen at the corner of Main and Bryant Streets in Buffalo, busily chopping veggies, opening cans, cutting desserts into serving-sized portions, washing dishes, and serving patrons of the St. Vincent de Paul Dining Room.

These are the people of the parish's St. Vincent de Paul TASK Force - where TASK stands for Tuesday at the Soup Kitchen.

This community volunteer program started three years ago with a conversation between Kate Brace, manager of the dining room, and Marianne Gable, a member of the St. Vincent de Paul Conference at St. Mary's.

By working in the dining room (Brace notes that it actually is not referred to as a "soup kitchen"), volunteers help enable between 120 and 200 clients a day to enjoy a hot, hearty meal. The dining room has just three permanent staff members, whose work is aug-

mented by a total volunteer force of up to 20 per day from area parishes. Some of these dedicated volunteers have been serving the program for more than a decade.

In addition to a meal, goody bags of bread and pastries are offered to each departing client.

St. Marianne Cope, OSF Saint from New York State Celebrates Feast Day August 9

Barbara Koob (now officially "Cope") was born on January 23, 1838 in Hessen, Germany. She was one of 10 children born to Peter Koob, a farmer, and Barbara Witzenbacher Koob.

The year after Barbara's birth, the family emigrated to the United States, where they settled in Utica, NY. They joined St. Joseph Parish, where Barbara attended school until 8th grade, when her father's ill health required her to get a factory job to help the family.

In August 1862, once her family was grown, Barbara was allowed to join the Sisters of the Third Order of Saint Francis in Syracuse. She professed her vows in November of the following year, taking the name Marianne, and began teaching at Assumption Parish School. Over time, Sr. Marianne became school principal. She also helped establish two Catholic hospitals in central New York. She was a pioneer in insisting on a patient's right to refuse treatment.

By 1883, Sr. Marianne had become the Superior General of her congregation. It was at this time that she received a plea for help from leprosy



sufferers in Hawaii. King Kalakaua himself sent the letter, asking for aid in treating patients who were isolated on the island of Moloka'i. The king had already been declined by more than 50 other religious institutes. On October 22, 1883, Mother Marianne and six other sisters left for Hawaii. Upon their arrival, Mother Marianne began managing a hospital on the island of O'ahu, where victims of leprosy were sent for triage. The following year, Mother Marianne helped establish the Malulani hospital on the island of Maui,

where she opened a school for girls.

In 1888, Mother Marianne and two sisters went to Molokai to open a home for "unprotected women and girls." On Molokai, she also took charge of the home that Saint Damien de Veuster had established for men and boys. She was instrumental in changing life on Molokai by introducing cleanliness, pride, and fun to the colony. Bright scarves and pretty dresses for the women were part of her approach.

As Mother Marianne grew older, her workload only seemed to increase. Eventually, it became a burden on her frail body and she was confined to a wheelchair. Despite her physical limitations, she continued to work tirelessly. During all her years of work with leprosy patients, she never contracted the disease herself, which many regarded as a miracle in itself. Mother Marianne lived to the age of 80, passing away on August 9, 1918.

Marianne was beatified by Pope Benedict XVI on May 14, 2005. After her beatification, her remains were moved to Syracuse, New York and placed in a shrine. On October 21, 2012, she was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI.
