From Fr. Paul: Saint Mary's Messenger

Fifteen years ago (2008) "St. Mary's Messenger," a newsletter which first appeared in June 1912, and was "published in the interests of St. Mary's Church," was revised. This first *Messenger* was written while Rev. John V. Schaus was Rector and had the annual subscription price of \$1.00, 10 cents a single copy. Many stories, history,

and general information can be found in these editions that ran from 20 to 40 pages per issue. Copies of the first ten years of the *Messenger* (1912 to 1922) are kept in our parish rectory.

The return of the *Messenger* hopes to update current events happening here at St. Mary's and to give some background on Catholic belief and prac-

tices. The publication is mailed to all registered parishioners supplementing current news and events that can be found in our weekly parish bulletin.

Changes are happening! Six parishes united as a new parish (The Beloved Disciples of Christ the Lord) will be inaugurating a new publication to be delivered to all families in our area on a monthly basis.

This work is aimed at supplementing our mission to share the gospel in a manner reflecting our times and needs. We hope that it will be a valuable addition to your reading and learning life.

Our own St. Mary's *Messenger* will continue to be published. If you have ideas/questions/thoughts you might like explored, please let us know. Thank you for reading this work and hope to hear from you with your inputs and insights.



Taize Around the Cross Good Friday at 7 p.m.

St. Mary's is offering a unique experience of Prayer around the Cross on the evening of Good Friday. Taize Prayer Around the Cross includes song, silence, and Scripture in an atmosphere of quiet reflection around the Cross lasting about one hour. Candlelight surrounds the Cross, where participants are seated in a circle, allowing us to be immersed in prayer. The music is simple, with brief refrains repeated in the manner of the mantra of the Eastern Church. The prayerful repetitions permeate our spirit as we enter into the song and silence.

The chants of Taize, composed by Jacques Berthier, are sung at the ecumenical monastery at Taize in France. Every Friday evening the pilgrims and brothers of Taize celebrate the "Prayer Around the Cross." This special night prayer service provides an opportunity for the pilgrims to take their turn, at will, reverencing the Cross which is placed within the praying community.

At St. Mary of the Assumption Parish, we will be following their lead in providing an opportunity for parishioners of our greater Family of Parishes to gather around the Cross at 7 p.m. on Good Friday. You are invited on this evening to participate in the song, silence, and veneration of the Cross. In addition to the song, silence, and Scripture you will be given an opportunity to approach the Cross at your will to venerate it. You may bow, stand, or kneel before the Cross. You may also touch or kiss the Cross. Ample time will be allotted for all those approaching the Cross to move freely to and from all sides.

Taize Around the Cross will take place in the St. Mary of the Assumption Parish Center (in the school) at 7 p.m. on April 7, Good Friday. The Prayer Service will last about 1 hour. Come prepared to enter into quiet reflection on the Cross of Christ.

Venerable Jan Tyranowski

Feast Day March 15

Jan Leopold Tyranowski was born in Krakow, Poland on February 9, 1901 to Jan Tyranowski and Apolonia Hrobak. His father was a tailor, but had plans for his son to become an accountant, which the younger Jan did. He was a shy, quiet young man, with many interests, learning foreign languages, gardening and photography. He worked as an accountant until a debilitating illness caused him to step back, and he ended working as a tailor. As his stress levels decreased, he became happier, and started to become involved in his faith and parish life. At that time, he was also looking for "something." He felt there was an emptiness in him which he could not fill. During a homily by a Salesian priest, he heard the priest say that "...it was not difficult to be a Saint." It made him realize that it was not only religious who became saints. He began praying and researching, reading information from his parish priest, and he eventually came across the works of St. John of the Cross. These guided him and inspired him; his writings never left the side of Jan for the rest of his life.

Jan decided to devote his life, as much as possible, to a contemplative life as a lay person. He took a vow of chastity, and organized his life, as much as possible to life as a monastic, while still caring for his mother. As he became increasingly spiritual, the war became part of his life as well. In 1940, a parish priest asked him to lead a class of young men, as many priests had been deported by Nazi Germany. He was unsure of this, as a quiet man, but he accepted the role. Jan created groups of men, calling them "living Rosary" groups. As the war continued, he held meetings in his apartment, as well as supporting the Salesians, who were being arrested and sent to Dachau. As part of his ministry, he created paper circles

with flowers painted on them, along with the names of virtues, such as modesty, chastity and obedience. The group members would practice these for a month, until they became ingrained habits. The groups also prayed the mysteries of the rosary. Each group of 15 would pray 1 decade of the rosary, assuring the whole rosary was prayed. One of his members, who became group leader, was Karol Wojtyla. Jan also introduced Wojtyla to the works of St. John of the Cross. It was due to Jan Tyranowski that Karol Wojtyla began to consider becoming a priest. He also influenced his lifelong Marian devotion.

It has been said that God uses his enemies to do His will. The Nazis took the priests away, leaving Jan Tyranowski to work with the young men's spiritual development, discovering he had a talent for nurturing souls. They were small numbers, and no one outside of Krakow would have heard of him, if not for Karol Wojtyla, but from his "living Rosary" groups there were 11 vocations, and 1 future pope. Jan continued his work, but was unable to attend the ordination of Karol Wojtyla, as he had developed tuberculosis, and had his arm removed to slow its progression. Pope John Paul II never forgot the influence of Jan on his life, keeping a small portrait of

him in his apartment. Jan died on March 15, 1947, holding a crucifix in his hand. His cause for Sainthood was put forward by the Salesians in 1997. His remains were moved from his family vault to the church of St. Stanislaus Kostka in the Debniki district of Krakow. They are kept in a casket inside a glass case. He was named Venerable on January 20, 2017.



St. Mary's Parishioner Named President of Ladies of Charity USA

We begin the new year of 2023 on a note of optimism for the continued growth of Ladies of Charity here at St. Mary's, in the Buffalo area, and around the nation. This year I begin a two year term as LCUSA (Ladies of Charity of the United States of America) National President and offer myself as a humble servant in order to keep alive the purpose and vision of St. Vincent de Paul, St. Louise de Marillac, and St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, our founders.

I first became a Lady of Charity in 2008 after being asked many times before by a very patient leader in our parish of St. Mary's in Lancaster, Mary Faulhaber, who waited until I graduated from Christ the King Seminary with a Masters in Pastoral Ministry. She persuaded me to join at a Ministry Fair held here at St. Mary's in the summer of 2008 and I came to my first meeting of the group in September of that year. After a few months of attendance, I became the parish treasurer and eventually the president of our local group. Soon I joined our local Diocesan board as an at large member and then Spiritual Moderator when our Daughter of Charity, Sister Mary Grace Higgins, was transferred out of Western New York. I was elected to the LCUSA Board in 2017 at the urging of Kathy Sieracki, an LCUSA Board member at the time and local leader, and have been on the board ever since as a Regional Director and President elect. I have had many jobs on the board including Nominations and Madagascar Chair and member of the Advocacy and Membership committees.

My own background before the Seminary was in education. I taught math, social studies, religion, and reading in Catholic schools for thirty-five years until I retired completely in June of 2015. I also taught religious education for a number of years at my home parishes of St. Josephs in North Tonawanda and St. Mary's in

Lancaster. I loved being a teacher and especially enjoyed being with the kids. I also have been a Eucharistic Minister and Lector here at St. Mary's for many years. I have two children with my husband Mike, a daughter, Michelle, who is a Palliative and Supportive Care physician at Roswell Park Memorial Cancer Institute in Buffalo and a son, Christopher, who is the head computer technician at Wind-song Radiology in Western New York. I also have a wonderful daughter and son-in law and two wonderful grandchildren, twins Alexander and Evelyn, age seven and a half, who are the "apples of grandma's eye". My husband, Michael, is a retired Public Librarian in Erie County and we have been married for forty-eight years.

Some of my goals for this first year are to see an increase in our LOC membership across the country. After COVID, we are struggling, like many other volunteer organizations, to bring members back to full participation in our activities which help the poor and marginalized in our communities. This will be a process but we need to stick with it and make the effort to let our parishes and communities know of what we do and why we do it. Another goal is to expand the organization and implementation of Junior Ladies of Charity groups. Not only are Juniors our future but they are also our present. I have our own Juniors here at St. Mary's as a perfect example of how hard the young ladies work to help those in need in our area. A third goal is to have Ladies of Charity work more closely with other organizations such as St. Vincent de Paul Society and Catholic Charities for example to better serve those in need in our communities.

In closing, I would like to say that I am looking forward to meeting as many ladies who belong to the Ladies of Charity across the country as I can. Our


