Upcoming Synod


An interesting and important synod called by Pope Francis is scheduled to hold the first of two summit meetings this October in Rome. The second session will take place in October 2024. The "Synod" in some ways is similar to a general church council (like Vatican II) but different in that it has been designed to bring together many members of our church at grass root levels. It began as an opportunity to listen, discuss, and design possible ways for moving us as Catholics forward into the 21st century with renewed faith and vision.

In a document issued by the Vatican this May, the results of listening sessions among Catholics held throughout the last months, presents a synthesis of all the discernment and dialogue that has taken place so

far and will build on the "Enlarge the space of your tent" (Instrementum Laboris – it's Latin title) released last October (2022).

The Synod has been prepared by fellow Catholic communities sharing their concerns in locally held sessions. Meetings were held in our country, diocese, and here at St. Mary's. Thanks to those who shared their thoughts here in our parish. It is the hope that the insights suggested by fellow Catholics around the world may help all understand that there is more than one way of being Church and that unity should not be sought in a "rigid uniformity." A delicate balance is necessary. With prayerful hearts and hopes may this upcoming synod be guided and inspired by the Holy Spirit!

WINGS Celebrates 10 Years!

Ten years ago, five friends sat around a table in the Gathering Room at St. Mary's Elementary School. As active members of the school community, this wasn't the first time they had met in this room. Many hours had been spent in that same space planning school fundraisers, field trips, and classroom service projects. This Saturday morning, however, the agenda was different. This time, these women were drawn together by a deeper calling, a calling to grow closer to Jesus.

With the support of Father Paul Steller, this small group continued to meet on Saturday mornings. The women quickly realized that this time together provided much needed nourishment for their minds, hearts, and souls. With Biblical text as a foundation, they shared and discussed their faith and how to invite Jesus into their everyday lives, often busy with making lunches, driving to soccer games, and checking homework.

Upon completing their first study,

these five women were changed. They had experienced God's Word in a powerful and intimate way and had a thirst for more! They also sensed that they were not alone. They knew there must be other women out there just like them, women of faith who wanted to draw closer to Jesus and God's Word but didn't know how. They hung a few flyers on the walls of St. Mary's and 35 women stepped forward and said "yes". With that, in February 2013, WINGS was born.

For the past ten years, WINGS
"Women in God's Spirit" has gathered
women of faith to share and grow
in their love for Jesus. Women of all
ages, backgrounds, experiences, and
faith traditions make up this dynamic
group. Over the years, WINGS has
studied many Books of the Bible
including Esther, Jonah, Hebrews,
and the Gospels. We encourage and
challenge each other to live out our
faith in meaningful ways and to be a
"light" to others.

WINGS is currently 55 women strong. We hold sessions in both the spring

and fall and meet every other Saturday morning from 9-10:30 a.m. Our time together is spent reading the Bible, watching teaching videos, reflecting, and praying. Over the years, we have shared much laughter and also some tears. We have celebrated births and marriages and mourned deaths. We have witnessed two women come home to the Catholic Church through RCIA. We have completed numerous service projects and the generosity of our group has blessed many. Above all, through friendship and fellowship, we have grown closer to Jesus!

This past January, we were blessed with the birth of "WINGS - South". This sister group of 35 women meet at St. Anthony in Farnham and share the same sense of friendship and fellowship as our Lancaster group. God in Daily Life

Question:

How do I bring God into the work of my daily life?

Answer:

Whatever your daily work, you have an opportunity to encounter God and to follow His commandments in love. In the New Testament, we see that most of the Apostles didn't have a previous religious position. They were fishermen, tax collectors, and political activists. St. Paul was a tentmaker. Among the saints, we have doctors, lawyers, farmers, and stayat-home moms. No matter your daily tasks, God can be present there!

One way concerns behavior. Start with an examination of conscience. Look at areas where you tend to struggle to imitate Christ at work. Do you gossip? Does brimming frustration become impatience at home? Pick one sin you struggle with, then choose a virtue to strengthen that area. If you tend to speak poorly of your co-workers, resolve to stop and to say one kind thing a day instead.

Another way relates to perspective, particularly your perspective of others. Jesus' incarnation reminds us of the value of every human being. Jesus is God, and each of us is created in God's image. When you encounter another person, you have an opportunity to see God in a new place and a new way — in that person in front of you. Genuinely listen to them and be present to their concerns. Loving your neighbor is loving God! Our relationship with God and the love He inspires in our hearts shouldn't remain only at church on Sunday. We can — and should — let our faith animate our lives! ©LPi

The Church Poor Box By Jim Snyder

The origin of the Church poor box is Biblical. In the New Testament, in Luke 21:1-4, Jesus observes an old widow putting in two small mites. The mite, also known as a lepton, was a Jewish coin and the smallest used in New Testament time. It was worth 1/64 of a denarius. A denarius was a day's wage for a common worker. In today's terms, its value would have amounted to 1/8 of a cent. Jesus drew attention to this because all the other people were giving out of their abundance. The widow gave all she had to live on. She trusted in God.

Most Catholic Churches have poor boxes varying in appearance and size. The one pictured below is at the missions Church in Capistrano, California and dates back to the 1500's.

Saint Mary Elizabeth Hesselblad by Barb Owczarczak, Pastoral Minister

Elizabeth Hesselblad was born on June 4, 1870, the fifth child of thirteen born to Augusto Roberto Hesselblad and Cajsa Pettesdotter Dag, in Faglavik, a small town in the province of Alvsborg, Sweden. The next month she was baptized into the Lutheran Church of Sweden, in her parish in Hundene. As she grew, the family was forced to move due to the economic trouble of the time. By 1886, she went to work to help support the family, and eventually moved to the United States. She went to nursing school at the Roosevelt Hospital in New York, and worked with the sick and aged, caring for Catholics in New York City. Being exposed to so many Catholics, her interest in The Catholic faith grew, and she came to feel, with deep prayer and personal study, that to be Catholic was a place to be closer to Christ.

On August 15, 1902, she received a conditional baptism from Fr. Johann George Hagen, S.J., who then became her spiritual director. She would later write that at the moment of her baptism, "In an instant the love of God was poured over me. I understood that I could respond to that love only through sacrifice and a love prepared

to suffer for His glory and for the Church. Without hesitation I offered Him my life, and my will to follow Him on the Way to the Cross." Two days later, she made her First Communion, then she left for Rome, where she received her Confirmation.

She returned to New York briefly, but then returned to Rome, where she entered the Carmelite House of Saint Bridget of Sweden. In 1906 she professed her vows. Elizabeth had hopes of reviving the order in both her native Sweden and in Rome. On November 9, 1911, she received 3 young English postulants, and refounded the order in Rome. In 1923, she returned to her home land in Sweden, and established a community in Djursholm. In 1931, she received from the Holy See permission to have permanent use of the church and the House of St. Bridget in Rome. In the meantime, her foundation was spreading through Europe, and to India. As her order grew, with its ministry of charity and peace, Elizabeth is credited with hiding twelve Jewish people in a convent to prevent their deportation to a German prisoner camp. They were kept safe until the city was liberated on June 4, 1944.

Elizabeth's health, which was never

ideal, declined around the time of the canonical visit of her order. On April 23, 1957 she gave her blessing to her sisters, raised her hands in a solemn gesture, and murmured,"Go to heaven with hands full of love and virtues." She died in the early morning hours on June 24, 1957. She was canonized June 5, 2016 by Pope Francis. Her feast day is June 4. She is a patroness of Bridgettines, nuns, and nurses.


